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INTRODUCTION

The year 2024-25 marked a period of innovation, resilience, and expansion for WATCH. The organisation strengthened its mission of creating inclusive, healthy, and sustainable development pathways for children, women, youth, and vulnerable households. WATCH adopted several new innovations such as Digital Education Corners, Nutrition Baseline & Growth Tracking, Women-Led Micro Enterprise Incubation, Tele-health counselling for HIV-affected children, Girls First Initiative, and Livelihood Accelerator Training.

248 children facilitated for full immunisation. Maternal health support, anaemia screenings, and health camps were organised.

Home for Children Living with HIV/AIDS

WATCH continued to provide 24/7 comprehensive care for 40 HIV-affected and infected children. Support included enhanced nutrition, hygienic accommodation, digital learning, daily tuition, ART adherence, tele-consultations, and emotional wellbeing sessions.



EDUCATION, SCHOOL ENROLLMENT & CHILD DEVELOPMENT

108 new children enrolled in school, 27 dropouts reintegrated, and 14 adolescents guided to vocational programmes. The Learning Through Play model improved reading and comprehension skills.



HEALTH INITIATIVES & IMMUNISATION

CAMPAIGN

248 children facilitated for full immunisation. Maternal health support, anaemia screenings, and health camps were organised. A new Mobile Health Helpdesk provided tele-support for illness, ART, counselling, and referrals.



Sports, Recreation & Child Wellbeing

More than 350 children participated in sports events, yoga, art, craft, dance, and cultural activities. Creativity Lab introduced drawing, modelling, and recycled craft.

Strengthening Women's Self-Help Groups (SHGs)

38 SHGs strengthened through leadership training, digital transaction skills, financial literacy, and rights awareness. Women-led micro enterprises such as tailoring units, millet snack preparation, eco-friendly bags, and mobile food carts were supported.



Mobilisation of Government Programmes

296 families accessed widow pension, old age pension, disability benefits, scholarships, ration cards, and health insurance. A Government Scheme Helpdesk assisted with applications and follow-up.

Skill Development Initiatives

Computer education trained 102 youth in digital tools and job applications. Tailoring training supported 62 women. Livelihood Accelerator Training covered entrepreneurship, branding, digital marketing, and financial planning.



Community Relief & Emergency Support

430 families received ration kits, nutrition supplements, sanitary napkins, clothing, school materials, and emergency support. A Nutrition Monitoring System tracked growth and counselled mothers.



Overall Impact Summary 2024–25

- 40 children supported in HIV/AIDS Home
- 108 children newly enrolled in school
- 27 dropouts reintegrated
- 248 children immunised
- 350+ children in sports & creativity programmes
- 38 SHGs strengthened
- 296 families accessed schemes
- 102 youth received computer training
- 62 women trained in tailoring
- 430 families received nutrition & relief support



Strategic Innovations

Digital Learning Corners, Mobile Health Helpdesk, Girls First Initiative, Nutrition Monitoring Baseline, SHG Enterprise Incubation, Creativity Lab, Tele-counselling services.

Way Forward – 2025–26

Plans include livelihood hubs, digital tailoring courses, child protection committees, expanded residential home facilities, career guidance desk, millet nutrition programme, and scaled tele-health services.
